- ✓ Officially adopting the final maps and study products into their county floodplain ordinances so they are available to support decision making and educate property owners.
- ✓ Maintain the 4 County Inter-governmental Agreement to coordinate variance review requests along the Big Hole River corridor.
- ✓ Maintain the standards that are currently administered through the Big Hole Conservation Development Standards including a minimum setback of 150 feet from the mean high water mark.
- ✓ Consider higher standards that specifically protect property and floodplain functions found in the State Model Regulations.
